I am running for City of Miami Commissioner for District 3 because Miami has given me and my family so much, and I am committed to giving back to the community that shaped me. Born in Havana and having lived in Miami for nearly 12 years now, I know firsthand the challenges our families face. Over the last three years, I've served as General Manager of a well-known Miami restaurant, where I learned the value of hard work, leadership, and accountability. I also earned a degree in International Relations & Political Science from Florida International University, equipping me with the knowledge to navigate complex policy issues. And I have accomplished all this through hard work and determination. This combination of management experience and academic training has prepared me to be an effective public servant who brings both practical solutions and a deep commitment to public service.

I would also advocate for transparency and accountability in how those funds are used, ensuring they go directly toward housing that working families can afford.

Our residents are feeling the impacts of flooding and rising sea levels. As commissioner, I will request for an immediate audit of the Miami Forever Bonds to determine what projects remain outstanding and reprogram projects to include expedited stormwater management, seawalls, and green spaces that reduce flooding. I would also fight to secure state and federal funding to ensure these projects don't overly burden local taxpayers.

If elected, would you defend, support, and protect immigrants in the City of Miami, regardless of status?

As an immigrant myself, I know the struggles and opportunities that come with making Miami home. I would oppose any policies that seek to criminalize or discriminate against legal immigrants. Instead, I would work to expand access to city services, strengthen language-access programs, and collaborate with community-based organizations to ensure immigrants feel safe. As commissioner, I will first seek clear guidance from the City Attorney on the pending lawsuit from South Miami and request that the City consider joining the lawsuit to better receive guidance from the Courts as questions remain if cities are required to sign these agreements. Partnering local police with federal immigration enforcement undermines trust between immigrant communities and law enforcement and further dilutes needed police resources from achieving the mission of the agency. I believe local resources should prioritize community safety over deportation.
